

SR-14 Cedar Canyon



Crystal Springs – SUU Road This area is on the north side of Cedar Canyon, just below the rim. There are no official trails. Most routes follow unplowed dirt roads or summer hiking-biking trails. There are some great, uncrowded, and possibly wild opportunities here. Most routes are intermediate to difficult and require route finding and backcountry skills. Except for the SUU Road which can be done by adventuresome beginners



Wood's Ranch – Webster Flat Area Excellent opportunities for off-trail backcountry explorations on and off old dirt roads. With sledding, snow-play, and reliable parking at Wood's Ranch County Park Most routes are intermediate to difficult and require route finding and backcountry skills.

Brian Head – Cedar Breaks This is the best place to access the world-class views from the rim of Cedar Breaks N.M. There are also easily accessed ungroomed trails and routes in and around Brian Head. OK for beginners with some route finding skills, but the farther in the more skills required



Castle Valley Area Here is a place that just wants to be explored. The Castle Valley area is east of Cedar Breaks and north of SR-143. For various reasons it gets very little use by skiers or snowshoers. There are lots of little ponds and creeks, rolling hills, large meadows, and old and new cabins. OK for beginners with some route finding skills, but farther in the more skills required.

Cedar Mountain Winter Trails

Cedar Mountain has a multiplicity of trails, routes, and places that are great for cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, fat tire biking or however you want to enjoy the great snow and beautiful winter landscapes of Cedar Mountain.

Deer Hollow Winter Recreation Area

is the premier cross-country ski area on Cedar Mountain. It is managed by the Dixie National Forest for non-motorized winter recreation and is closed to snowmobiles. D.N.F. with CMNSC and other local volunteers maintain 16.3 miles of ski-only and multi-use trails (11.2 miles are groomed regularly). *Great for novice to expert.*



Cedar Breaks South includes the southern end of Cedar Breaks N.M., Blowhard Mountain. *Most routes are intermediate to difficult and require route finding and backcountry skills*

except the route to Cedar Breaks which is fairly easy, but long.



The Gooseberry Area is the area south-west of SR-14, from the summit just west of the junction with SR-148 to Deer Hollow Winter Recreation Area. .

There are dozens of old logging roads, skid trails, open meadows which are great for exploring. The areas near SR-14 are *OK for beginners with some route finding skills, but the farther in the more skills required.*



Cedar Mountain South This area is south-east of Deer Hollow with similar terrain with one pull-out and one parking area (intended for snowmobile use). Some the of few water features

along SR-14 are in this area including Navajo Lake. *Most routes are intermediate to difficult and require route finding and backcountry skills*
